#### WE'RE BRINGING EVERYONE TO THE PLAYGROUND!

It's almost time for everyone to play in one of New England's largest adaptive playgrounds at Spaulding Academy & Family Services! The development process for this unique playground, which will be located behind the Lambert building, is nearing completion and equipment installation is in the planning stages.

The playground will be an impressive 10,308 square feet and will feature a wide variety of carefully selected adaptive and accessible equipment that will help children develop balance and motor skills, while enjoying social time with friends. Many of the features are sensory-friendly and all were chosen for their benefits to children of every ability.

"As Spaulding Academy & Family Services is always keenly tuned to the needs of each of our children, our team recognized that some were unable to play outdoors with dignity and inclusion," explains Todd Emmons, CEO & President, Spaulding Academy & Family Services. "This adaptive playground has been a true labor of love for our staff. We are beyond thrilled to unveil it to the children and provide them a lifetime of happy memories of play with their friends."

The playground will have wheelchair-friendly poured rubber surfacing and sun protection shades to provide strategic coverage for children with light and heat sensitivities. Examples of the special equipment selected from Miracle Recreation include wheelchair swings, a sensory environment, and an inclusive glider that is wheelchair-accessible and can accommodate 10 children at once.

Spaulding Academy & Family Services has partnered with Pettinelli & Associates to plan and install the adaptive playground. The blueprint is complete, and the team is working to expedite delivery of the equipment to campus.

# SUMMER 2022 every child deserves a childhood

#### **USING NATURE TO EDUCATE**

Thanks to the innovation of Brittany Rozen, RDN, LD of the Health Services team and the partnership of Spaulding Academy Special Education and Life Science Teacher Evan Barden, the children of Spaulding Academy & Family Services have a new outdoor experiential learning opportunity on campus. A 30 by 40 square foot teaching garden features bell peppers, hot peppers, carrots, corn, cucumbers, green beans, lettuce, pumpkins, squash, snap peas, tomatoes, basil, and edible flowers, including sunflowers.

"Evan and I created this as a way for students to physically connect with their education by growing and harvesting a variety of fruits and vegetables," Brittany says. "We discuss science, history, and nutrition as we work in the garden and plan to further align our lessons with Academy classroom curriculums. In addition, the garden offers mini field trips right on campus and provides a break from technology."

Along with integrating education across subjects, the garden provides a sensory-friendly, hands-on opportunity to learn where food comes from, how to grow food, and to taste new, freshly picked produce. Brittany is working with Dining Services to plan to bake garden-grown sunflower seeds with the children at season's end.

In addition to the garden, two chicken coops have been brought to campus: one by the Community Center and another by Wednesday House. Both coops have 12 chicks for the children to help feed and watch them grow. They will eventually help gather eggs and use them for food preparation on campus.



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### EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT: Cindy Kurahara Leads Colleagues and Families with Care

It's been nearly nine years since Cindy Kurahara, MSW, LICSW, left retirement to directly support families and staff of the Spaulding Academy & Family Services Community Based Programs. With years of experience working in foster care and adoption at Casey Family Services, she originally joined the team part-time as a Family Aide. However, a family she assisted made such a personal impact that she decided to become a case manager. As the program developed further, she assumed the position of clinical supervisor, mentoring staff and reviewing required program documentation.

The community and in-home based program coordinates family care and support in partnership with New Hampshire's Division for Children Youth and Families (DCYF) and other area family services. Along with Director of Community Based Programs Nicole Babineau, MS, Cindy leads staff development efforts by supervising the work of clinicians, case managers, and family aides - as well as social work and mental health interns from regional colleges.



"We offer an important resource to the community, state agencies, and families who need child protection, support, and help to get their lives together - and see if they can parent their kids again safely and successfully," Cindy explains. "Every case is different, and we work with children and families in every circumstance. When children are unable to reunite with their families, we support foster families who decide to adopt and help everyone make that transition."

# RESIDENTIAL: Wednesday House Kids Stay Connected

Since Wednesday House opened in February of 2021, the Community Residential Program team has consistently provided opportunities to keep its children connected to activities that enrich their personal growth. Currently, there are 9 kids living at Wednesday House ranging in age from 8 to 16 who were referred from the New Hampshire Division for Children Youth and Families (DCYF) due to significant adverse childhood experiences and complex trauma. They typically can be educated in their community schools while healing, learning to feel safe, and acquiring healthy coping and life skills at Wednesday House.

Depending on their interests, these resilient children participate in activities at their home schools including drama club, track, and summer school programs, or extracurricular activities like therapeutic equine therapy and dance. The Community Residential Program team works directly with each child's DCYF case manager to identify activities that would be most enjoyable. Some are available on campus, including a garden planned specifically for Wednesday House and caring for chicks in the nearby chicken coop.

"We work hard to give kids as normal a childhood as possible," says Walter Hall,

Community Residential Program Manager. "We also look for ways to have our children give back - including volunteer clean ups of the Winnispesaukee River

Trail - in order to instill a sense of community."

circumstances," says Nicole Babineau, MS, Community Based Programs Director. "I heard a child who was recently adopted tell another child still in foster care, 'There's a family out there for you. I know you'll find your family."

Next year, the Community Based Programs team hopes to return to its pre-pandemic Foster Family Appreciation event style by hosting a large-scale event on campus with other agencies, including DCYF.
